DEPARTMENT INVOLVED: CITY COUNCIL, CITY MANAGER							
BACKGROUND/SUMMARY AB 1665 extends the California Advanced Service Fund (CASF) and authorizes additional collections of a modest fee on telephone bills to support broadband infrastructure deployment and adoption in unserved and disadvantaged communities. Internet access should be treated as a right, not a luxury. It is a basic necessity to access education, health care and economic opportunity. This bill will ensure vulnerable communities across the state are not left behind in the 21st century. This bill does not involve a new fee or tax and does not burden the General Fund. The specifics regarding the total amount of funds to be collected overall (and annually) and the principles and provisions for implementation are being negotiated among stakeholders.

An act to amend Sections 281 and 914.7 of the Public Utilities Code, relating to communications.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1665, as introduced, Eduardo Garcia. Telecommunications: California Advanced Services Fund.

Under existing law, the Public Utilities Commission has regulatory authority over public utilities, including telephone corporations. Existing law establishes, among other funds related to telecommunications, the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) in the State Treasury. Existing law requires the commission to develop, implement, and administer the CASF to encourage deployment of high-quality advanced communications services to all Californians that will promote economic growth, job creation, and the substantial social benefits of advanced information and communications technologies, as provided in specified decisions of the commission to give priority to projects that provide last-mile broadband access to households that are unserved by an existing facilities-based broadband provider. Existing law establishes that the goal of the program is, no later than December 31, 2015, to approve

funding for infrastructure projects that will provide broadband access to no less than 98% of California households. Existing law authorizes the commission to collect a surcharge for deposit into the CASF not to exceed \$315,000,000 in total and authorizes the surcharge until 2020. Existing law establishes 4 accounts within the CASF and specifies the amount of moneys to be deposited into each account.

This bill would retain that the goal of the program is to approve funding for infrastructure projects that will provide broadband access to no less than 98% of California households, but would provide that this goal is to be achieved by December 31, 2023. The bill establishes a 5th account within the CASF, the Broadband Adoption Account, and provides that an unspecified amount shall be deposited into each of the 5 accounts. The bill repeals the current authorization to collect up to \$315,000,000 for deposit in the CASF at a rate of up to \$25,000,000 per year through the 2020 calendar year, and instead authorizes the commission to collect an unspecified amount for deposit into the CASF beginning January 1, 2018, and continuing through the 2027 calendar year. The bill would repeal funding and authority to expend specified sums for certain purposes from one of the CASF accounts, the Broadband Public Housing Account, and would authorize the expenditure of an unspecified amount of moneys from that account.

Existing law requires the commission to annually report specified information relative to the CASF to the Legislature. Existing law repeals these reporting requirements on January 1, 2022.

This bill would instead require the commission to biennially report specified information relative to the CASF to the Legislature and would revise the information specified for inclusion. The bill would repeal these reporting requirements on January 1, 2030. The bill would require the commission to identify priority unserved and underserved areas and delineate the priority areas in the biennial reports. The bill would require the commission to consult regional consortia, stakeholders, and consumers regarding priority areas and cost-effective strategies to achieve the broadband access goal through public workshops conducted at least annually no later than April 30 of each year.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. This act shall be known, and may be cited, as the
 Internet for All Now Act.

3 SEC. 2. The Legislature finds and declares all of the following: 4 (a) The availability of high-speed Internet access, referred to generically as "broadband" and including both wired and wireless 5 technologies, is essential 21st century infrastructure for economic 6 7 competitiveness and quality of life. Economic studies confirm that 8 the use of broadband technologies increases economic productivity 9 as a foundation for increased efficiency in organizational operations 10 and enhanced profitability in business.

11 (b) Broadband infrastructure is also vital to the operation and 12 management of other critical infrastructure, such as energy 13 generation systems and the electrical grid, water supply systems, 14 and public safety and emergency response networks. There is a 15 need for world-class broadband infrastructure throughout California 16 to support these major infrastructure investments, and thereby to 17 protect lives, property, and the environment. 18 (c) It is the intent of the Legislature that California be a national

19 leader and globally competitive in the deployment and adoption

of broadband technology and to implement quality universal access for all residents.

22 SEC. 3. Section 281 of the Public Utilities Code is amended 23 to read:

24 281. (a) The commission shall develop, implement, and 25 administer the California Advanced Services Fund program to 26 encourage deployment of high-quality advanced communications 27 services to all Californians that will promote economic growth, 28 job creation, and the substantial social benefits of advanced 29 information and communications technologies, consistent with 30 this section.

12 (d) (1) All moneys collected by the surcharge authorized by 13 the commission pursuant to Decision 07-12-054 shall be transmitted to the commission pursuant to a schedule established 14 15 by the commission. The commission shall transfer the moneys 16 received by the commission from the surcharge imposed to fund 17 the accounts to the Controller for deposit in the California 18 Advanced Services Fund. 13 (2) Notwithstanding any other law and for the sole purpose of 14 providing matching funds pursuant to the federal American 15 Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Public Law 111-5), any 16 entity eligible for funding pursuant to that act shall be eligible to 17 apply to participate in the program administered by the commission 18 pursuant to this section, if that entity otherwise satisfies the 19 eligibility requirements under that program. Nothing in this section 20 shall impede the ability of an incumbent local exchange carrier, 21 as defined by subsection (h) of Section 251 of Title 47 of the 22 United States Code, that is regulated under a rate of return 23 regulatory structure, to recover, in rate base, California 24 infrastructure investment not provided through federal or state 25 grant funds for facilities that provide broadband service and 26 California intrastate voice service. 27 (2) (A) The commission shall be responsible for achieving the

3 (3) Notwithstanding subdivision (b) of Section 270, an entity 4 that is not a telephone corporation shall be eligible to apply to 5 participate in the program administered by the commission pursuant to this section to provide access to broadband to an unserved or 6 underserved household, as defined in commission Decision 7 8 12-02-015, if the entity otherwise meets the eligibility requirements 9 and complies with program requirements established by the 10 commission. These requirements shall include all of the following: 11 (A) That projects under this paragraph provide last-mile 12 broadband access to households that are unserved by an existing 13 facilities-based broadband provider and only receive funding to 14 provide broadband access to households that are unserved or

15 underserved, as defined in commission Decision 12-02-015.

(B) That funding for a project providing broadband access to
an underserved household shall not be approved until after any
existing facilities-based provider has an opportunity to demonstrate
to the commission that it will, within a reasonable timeframe,
upgrade existing service. An existing facilities-based provider
may, but is not required to, apply for funding under this section to
make that upgrade.

(C) That the commission shall provide each applicant, and any
 party challenging an application, the opportunity to demonstrate
 actual levels of broadband service in the project area, which the
 commission shall consider in reviewing the application.

(D) That a local governmental agency may be eligible for an
infrastructure grant only if the infrastructure project is for an
unserved household or business, the commission has conducted
an open application process, and no other eligible entity applied.

(E) That the commission shall establish a service list of
 interested parties to be notified of California Advanced Services
 Fund applications.

(f) Moneys in the Rural and Urban Regional Broadband
Consortia Grant Account shall be available for grants to eligible
consortia to fund the cost of broadband deployment activities other
than the capital cost of facilities, as specified by the commission.
An eligible consortium may include, as specified by the
commission, representatives of organizations, including, but not
limited to, local and regional government, public safety, elementary

1 and secondary education, health care, libraries, postsecondary 2 education, community-based organizations, tourism, parks and 3 recreation, agricultural, business, workforce organizations, and air 4 pollution control or air quality management districts, and is not 5 required to have as its lead fiscal agent an entity with a certificate

6 of public convenience and necessity.

7 (g) Moneys in the Broadband Infrastructure Revolving Loan 8 Account shall be available to finance capital costs of broadband 9 facilities not funded by a grant from the Broadband Infrastructure 10 Grant Account. The commission shall periodically set interest rates

11 on the loans based on surveys of existing financial markets.

12 (h) (1) For purposes of this subdivision, the following terms 13 have the following meanings:

14 (A) "Publicly subsidized" means either that the housing 15 development receives financial assistance from the United States 16 Department of Housing and Urban Development pursuant to an 17 annual contribution contract or is financed with low-income 18 housing tax credits, tax-exempt mortgage revenue bonds, general 19 obligation bonds, or local, state, or federal loans or grants and the 20 rents of the occupants, who are lower income households, do not 21 exceed those prescribed by deed restrictions or regulatory 22 agreements pursuant to the terms of the financing or financial 23 assistance.

24 (B) "Publicly supported community" means a publicly 25 subsidized multifamily housing development that is wholly owned 26 by either of the following:

27 (i) A public housing agency that has been chartered by the state, 28 or by any city or county in the state, and has been determined to 29 be an eligible public housing agency by the United States 30 Department of Housing and Urban Development.

31 (ii) An incorporated nonprofit organization as described in 32 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (26 U.S.C. Sec. 33 501(c)(3)) that is exempt from taxation under Section 501(a) of 34 that code (26 U.S.C. Sec. 501(a)), and that has received public 35 funding to subsidize the construction or maintenance of housing 36 occupied by residents whose annual income qualifies as "low" or 37

"very low" income according to federal poverty guidelines.

38 (2) Notwithstanding subdivision (b) of Section 270, moneys in

39 the Broadband Public Housing Account shall be available for the 40

commission to award grants and loans pursuant to this subdivision

1 to an eligible publicly supported community if that entity otherwise 2 meets eligibility requirements and complies with program

3 requirements established by the commission.

4 (3) (A) Not more than twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) 5 _ shall be available for grants and loans to a publicly supported 6 community to finance a project to connect a broadband network 7 to that publicly supported community. A publicly supported community may be an eligible applicant only if the publicly 8 9 supported community can verify to the commission that the 10 publicly supported community has not denied a right of access to 11 any broadband provider that is willing to connect a broadband 12 network to the facility for which the grant or loan is sought and 13 the publically supported community is unserved.

14 (B) (i) In its review of applications received pursuant to 15 subparagraph (A), the commission shall award grants only to 16 unserved housing developments.

(ii) For purposes of this subparagraph, a housing developmentis unserved when at least one housing unit within the housingdevelopment is not offered broadband Internet service.

20 (4) (A) Not more than five million dollars (\$5,000,000)

21 shall be available for grants and loans to a publicly supported 22 community to support programs designed to increase adoption 23 rates for broadband services for residents of that publicly supported 24 community. A publicly supported community may be eligible for 25 funding for a broadband adoption program only if the residential 26 units in the facility to be served have access to broadband services 27 or will have access to broadband services at the time the funding 28 for adoption is implemented.

(B) A publicly supported community may contract with othernonprofit or public agencies to assist in implementation of abroadband adoption program.

(5) To the extent feasible, the commission shall approve projects
for funding from the Broadband Public Housing Account in a
manner that reflects the statewide distribution of publicly supported
communities.

(6) In reviewing a project application under this subdivision,
the commission shall consider the availability of other funding
sources for that project, any financial contribution from the
broadband service provider to the project, the availability of any
other public or private broadband adoption or deployment program,

including tax credits and other incentives, and whether the applicant
has sought funding from, or participated in, any reasonably
available program. The commission may require an applicant to
provide match funding, and shall not deny funding for a project
solely because the applicant is receiving funding from another
source.

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7 (7) (A) To provide funding for the purposes of this subdivision, 8 the commission shall transfer to the Broadband Public Housing 9 Account twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) from the Broadband 10 Infrastructure Grant Account and five million dollars (\$5,000,000) 11 from the Broadband Infrastructure Revolving Loan Account.
